
Alexander Valdez


Cantalician Center School Age student Alexander Valdez had a major breakthrough in communication this year. As a child who is non-verbal and autistic, the 6-year-old would often become frustrated when he could not effectively communicate. This fall, Valdez's speech therapist spoke to his parents about using a "Speech Generating Device." His father agreed to come in for training and to have him take the device home. During the beginning of the trial, Valdez's father called to report that early one morning, his son woke up, grabbed the device, and used to it say, "I want Shrimp Scampi today!" His father was ecstatic and said, "Shrimp Scampi it is!" One goal of our School Age Services is to align technology to support needs. We believe Valdez is the perfect example of major strides all of our students can make with the innovative thinking of our dedicated team members. Way to go, Alexander. You make us proud!

Milan Sanders

When Cantalician Center Preschool student Milan Sanders began attending our school in the fall, she was using a transport chair and could crawl around her classroom. The 5-year-old enjoyed using a walker she already had, but was scared to try walking with it on her own. Sanders would walk holding the hands of our staff members, but didn't have the confidence to take steps on her own. After a year of teamwork between her classroom staff and therapists ensuring that she used her walker to get to her specials, ensuring that she used it to get from one side of the classroom to another, something clicked. Sanders started taking steps independently, flying from one end of the room to another, bursting confidence and pride. We believe she is the 'best practices' example of the importance of working as a team and carrying over strategies from the therapies to the classroom in order to achieve success. Awesome job, Milan. Wesley and Cameron Garrison struggled to interact socially with others and it would cause them to become easily frustrated. The 3-year-old twins didn't have the skills to self-regulate when they would get frustrated. They would also become easily distracted during activities at their daycare, such as story or circle time, and that's when their mother reached out to Cantalician Center's Early Childhood Community Services (ECCS).

After receiving over a year of special instruction that included music therapy, sensory play, structured play, and routine building, the boys are now thriving. They are able to sit for stories and music, and interact socially with their family members and peers. The Garrison twins are not only better prepared for a structured preschool setting, but will one day be better ready for kindergarten. We believe the twin brothers are a great example of how important it is for children who need it to receive special instruction at an early age.



She refers to her job search as a long journey with many ups and downs, but is so happy to have landed somewhere great. Badger accepts the challenges that she encounters each day and is taking them all in stride with support from our Employment Services department.





A major focus of Employment Services is to tailor the vocational services being delivered to each person. It's a multi-faceted approach in which each person goes through an intensive period of 'discovery' and 'assessment' to determine their employment goals. This approach creates a completely unique system for each person and allows our team to more intently focus on assisting them throughout their learning process.

We believe this process has proven successful for people like Badger. We could not be more proud of her achievements as well as those of the many others who receive Employment Services. We continue to utilize our multi-faceted approach with more people in need of supports in the community, while also working to expand the footprint of our contract services division, Diversified Labor Solutions.

Adam Carry has been attending Cantalician Center's Day Habilitation Services Without Walls (Day Hab WOW) since 2018. While participating in our services, he went through many life changes, from moving out of his parents' house and into a group home to experiencing a change in the location where he attended Day Hab. These changes greatly affected Carry, causing behavior challenges. Cantalician Center's team members not only tackled these challenges with Carry, but also with the entire Day Hab group, as they felt learning these skills would greatly benefit everyone. The group worked over several weeks to learn positive coping strategies and deep breathing methods to put into use when difficult obstacles would come their way. With the support from his Day Hab staff members and peers, he was able to successfully work through all of the curveballs that life threw at him. Today, Carry is known around his Day Hab group as the kindest most selfless person who works his hardest while volunteering through Meals on Wheels, Salvation Army, and Friends of the Night People. His goal is to make people smile and he achieves this regularly!

In the future, our Day Hab plans to integrate the seniors currently attending our services with seniors from the Western New York community so that they are able enjoy their retirement years together. We also plan to expand our volunteer opportunities and grow our Day Hab WOW by opening a location in Hamburg, New York, as we feel this will help impact more lives of people of all abilities.

Tenaya Johnson

18 year-old Tenaya Johnson began attending Cantalician Center's **Respite Services** as a very shy young person who kept to herself. She rarely talked to our team members or her peers, but after a year of team building activities, crafts, and group projects at our afterschool-based services, her personality blossomed. Johnson loves attending each day and has made it her goal to ensure that her peers love attending too. She enjoys making cards for her peers, greeting them at the door, and even trying to make them laugh by telling jokes or making funny faces. Johnson is a great example of the importance of giving children of all abilities a safe and engaging place to learn and play while their parents/caregivers work. In 2020, we plan to double our Respite enrollment to ensure that more students like Johnson are afforded the opportunity to grow and play in a safe afterschool setting.

The Cantalician Foundation, Inc. hosted its annual Celebration on May 23, 2019 at Templeton Landing in Buffalo, New York. The event was attended by 260 people and included cocktails, raffles, and auctions, as well as an awards presentation that recognized Philanthropist and Restaurateur, Russell J. Salvatore, for his contributions to Cantalician Center's Courtvard Renovation Project. Grants (2019)

The Children's Guild Foundation - \$30,000

Cantalician Center received a grant from the Children's Guild Foundation to purchase equipment for our yoga classes, provide yoga training opportunities to our staff and community partners, and document the effectiveness of incorporating yoga techniques in our daily curriculum.

The Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services - \$50,000

Cantalician Center received a Securing Communities Against Hate Crimes Grant from the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services to make security improvements to our school building and campus.

The Kelly for Kids Foundation - \$1,633.46

Cantalician Center received a Community Grant from the Kelly for Kids Foundation to purchase various gymnastic equipment for our Adapted Physical Education department.

The Regional Economic Development Corporation (REDC) – \$100,000
